#### **From the President**

I was a volunteer with the Marshfield Police Auxiliary for 20 years, holding nearly every position in the organization. I served on the city's Common Council for six and a half years, and fought year after year to maintain the city's funding of the North Wood County Historical Society (NWCHS), a battle I lost the last year I was there.

This past fall, I was inducted into the Mayflower Society. This was the culmination of years of work my wife completed to trace my roots back to George Soule, and then prove to the national organization

And, I want to thank the other members of the board for their patience with me as I learn this position. Additionally, Don Schnitzler continues to be an unbelievable resource for the NWCHS. His knowledge and direction continue to help me as I figure out my part as President.

I have now had the opportunity to work at two NWCHS events, the brat fry in Pittsville and the Cultural Fair at the Marshfield campus of UWSP. I found both events to be fun, exciting, and enriching. Talking with people from the community has been a great opportunity to brag about the incredible work that you all do. I would encourage everyone to jump into such events. 




#### April 21 Sunday- Woven May Baskets & Paper Flowers

#### Grace Maluge, organizer of the North Wood County Historical Society

During December 2023, Grace (Ives) Maluge was named the 108th inductee in Marshfield's 150: Heroes and Leaders, Past and Present register. She was nominated by her great-grand-daughter, Lynette (Werner) Pupp.

Interested in history and its preservation, Grace (Ives) Maluge recognized the importance of Marshfield having a historical society. Her effort was instrumental in seeing that organization established in 1952 and she continued to actively support its mission during the remainder of her life.

In 1952, with the help of John L. Stauber, then president of Marshfield's Old Settlers Club, and others interested in a local society, Grace arranged a meeting in the Marshfield Free Library on September 19, 1952 to consider options. Acting as chairwoman, she introduced Dr. Wilbur Glover of the State Historical Society who explained the necessary steps for organizing a historical society and the statutory requirements to be affiliated with the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

After John Stauber, speaker for the evening, stressed the need for such a group in this community, those in attendance voted unanimously for its organization to be known as the Marshfield Historical Society. Articles of incorporation were approved and certified by the secretary of state, Fred K. Zimmerman, October 17, 1952, and then filed by the Wood County register of deeds. The names of those forming the corporation included Mrs. William A. (Grace Ives) Maluge, Clarence C. Meyers, Mrs. Fred K. (Nellie Bohn) Kamps, Mrs. Caroline Hartl Allen and C. J. Dregne.

The first meeting of the new historical society was held in the Council Chamber of the Marshfield City Hall on November 7, 1952. In addition to local attendees, there were two staff members of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin, Margaret Gleason, reference librarian, and Donald McNeil, field representative also present. Among the first directors elected that evening was Grace Maluge, who has been recognized as the woman who pioneered the area society.

Four years later, the society changed its name from Marshfield Historical Society to the North Wood County Historical Society, hoping to attract and encourage interest and memberships outside the city of Marshfield.

Grace Elizabeth Ives was born on August 30, 1886, the daughter of George Washington and Fannie Elizabeth Ives. She had seven siblings. A brother, George Smith Ives, served as mayor of Marshfield from 1934-35 and was re-elected for the 1936-37 term. Another brother, Walter Ives, was the band leader of Wally Ives and the Jolly Dutchman band, and still another brother, Lovell Ives, was the music arranger and a member of the band, who also directed the Green Bay Packers Band from 1982 to 1997.

In 1904 Grace married William August Maluge who was a butter maker. Three years later they moved to Marshfield. They established residence at 301 North Peach Avenue where they operated a neighborhood grocery store on the property called Cash Corner Grocery. Later they operated another grocery store at 304 East Tenth Street. That store had been owned by Isadore Seidel.

William and Grace had three daughters, Charolotte, Ruth and Grace, who all graduated from Marshfield High School. In 1926 Will started to spend the summer months in Perkinstown, where he owned and operated a small resort, "Shady Nook," and a small grocery store. In 1932, Grace and her youngest daughter would join him for the summers after a local doctor told her that their youngest daughter's asthma would be relieved with the Northwoods air.

Throughout her life, Grace enjoyed collecting and preserving both community and family history, and she relished sharing these with family and friends. In 1972, as the city celebrated its centennial, Grace's efforts were memorialized at the North Wood County Historical Society Museum at Praschak Wayside Park with a portrait, engraved with the title, "Organizer of North Wood County Historical Society 1952."

### New logo for the Society

### Marshfield Historical Business Directory Database

A new Marshfield Historical Business Directory database is the result of a collaborative project between North Wood County Historical Society (NWCHS)and the Everett Roehl Marshfield Public Library during Marshfield's 150th Anniversary in 2022.

Historical society volunteers collected the business name, street address and directory date from phonebooks and city directories held by the historical society and library dating between 1881 and 2009.

They also prepared an individual database for each year, and then merged those into one comprehensive database. For convenient use, the all-inclusive database is sorted and saved as three documents, 1) alphabetical listing by name, 2) street name and address listing, and 3) business listing on Central Avenue only.

At this time, the directories are available only on the Everett Roehl Marshfield Public Library website. From their main navigation bar, select "Adults" and then on the dropdown menu select "Genealogy/ History Research." On the open page, the directories are listed under the heading, "Marshfield Historical Business Directories." When the historical society's website is updated links will be found there as well.

Volunteers who contributed to this project are Bob Apfel, Bob Kult, Sue Kult, Lorraine Rogers and Don Schnitzler. A new logo was developed as the visual identity for the Society by *Exclamation*, a Marshfield marketing agency, with financial support provided by a MainStreet Marshfield grant.

Whether visiting in person or online, the society provides a doorway (hence the logo door to the Upham House) to Marshfield and North Wood County History.
