Marshfield Police Auxiliary Celebrates 40 years this year!

In the mid 1970s when CB radios were peaking in popularity, of the various CB clubs which had been formed in the area, the Badgerland CB Radio Club became part of the Wood County Emergency Government Group II. This group would assist the Marshfield Police Department by providing monitoring during special events, and if assistance by officers was needed, they would call into the dispatch center using their CB mobile radios to contact a base station which was monitored 24 hours a day on the FCC designated Emergency Channel 9. Officers would then be dispatched to respond to the request for assistance.

In 1977 efforts to form an "Auxiliary Police Force" resulted in approval by the Common Council. Approximately 10 charter members, most from the original CB club & Emergency Govt.

Group II ranks, formed the initial membership of the Marshfield Police Auxiliary.

Over the years membership has varied in both numbers and make up. Earlier years found the membership around 30 and the number of donated hours as high as 5700. Those early rosters were largely made up of citizens who desired to provide service to their community without necessarily desiring to go into law enforcement as a career. Since 1977 the organization has seen a greater level of professionalism, greater focus on training, greater support form the Police Department.

The initial focus of the Auxiliary was patrol, the events that are now worked include wide variety.

Since 1970s, and as of May 2017, the Auxiliary has served 87,196 hours and the number of members is 188.


NWCHS Lecture Series—It Happened on Main Street

During Hub City Days


Friday. July 28th - 6:30PM
